

Dear Elders and Sisters,

As we begin a new year it is always a good idea to briefly reflect back upon the past prior to looking forward to our journey forward. By doing so, we can make necessary course corrections and establish worthy personal goals to help us avoid our mistakes of the past and to increase our effectiveness. *Preach My Gospel* (page 146) teaches..."Goals reflect the desires of our hearts and our vision of what we can accomplish. Through goals and plans, our hopes are transformed into actions. Goal setting and planning are acts of faith. Prayerfully set goals that are in harmony with the Savior's command to 'teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost' (Matthew 28:19)." Please prayerfully ponder this statement by The First Presidency from *Preach My Gospel* (page v) as you look forward to a new year of missionary work. "We challenge you to rise to a new sense of commitment to assist our Father in Heaven in His glorious work. Every missionary has an important role in helping 'to bring to pass the immortality and eternal life of man" (Moses 1:39)."

When President Schwitzer visited last month he taught about "conversion." In missionary work we most often speak about conversion as it relates to our investigators. However, we should regularly ponder concerning the depth of our own personal conversion. The Savior told Peter something that may seem rather puzzling. In Luke 22:32, the Savior said "…when thou are converted, strengthen thy brethren." Wasn't Peter already converted? Wasn't it Peter who boldly declared…"Thou are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:15)? Why do you think the Savior was concerned about Peter's conversion? Of course Christ knew what was about to transpire and that Peter would deny having known the Savior. One of the lessons learned from this experience is that conversion is a continual process. We can't simply say…"OK, I am converted so I can check that off from my 'to do' list." It isn't that simple or easy.

We are taught in the Book of Mormon what a deep and true conversion looks like. When describing a few of the Lamanites who were converted unto the true faith, Nephi writes: "...they would not depart from it, for they were firm, and steadfast, and immovable, willing with all diligence to keep the commandments of the Lord" (3 Nephi 6:14). In other words we must show the Lord we are converted by our actions. If we say we are converted but our actions do not demonstrate our conversion---we are only trying to fool ourselves and the Lord is neither deceived nor impressed.

Let's get to work. Your leaders have been instructed to hold you accountable. Accountability is a divine principle. It is designed to "help" not to "punish." President Monson has declared: "When performance is measured, performance improves. When performance is measured and reported, the rate of improvement accelerates" (*Preach My Gospel*, page 150). I testify that the Lord will hold us accountable for the way we use our time, not only while serving our missions, but throughout our lives. We know we have been cautioned that we…"not procrastinate the day of [our] repentance until the end; for after this day of life, which is given to prepare for eternity, behold, if we do not improve our time while in this life, then cometh the night of darkness wherein there can be no labor performed" (Alma 34:33). Even temporary change is difficult, permanent change is even more difficult, but both kinds of change are possible. There will never be a better time to change our lives for the better than right now. The longer we wait the more difficult it becomes. Besides that---who knows how long "this day of life" will be for us. I testify this is the Lord's work. "The Lord will reward and

richly bless you as you humbly and prayerfully serve Him. More happiness awaits you than you have ever experienced you labor among His children" (The First Presidency, *Preach My Gospel*, page v). Sincerely, *President Durn*

MESSAGE FROM THE A.P.'S

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
As we walk through the dark alleys of Armenia, "Endowed with power from on high," one can't help but wonder if we are a source of light for those who have none. This light is seen in those that have a sealed testimony of the Savior and His church.



Therefore, this New Year season provides a wonderful opportunity to evaluate both the depth and sincerity of our testimony. President Faust labels a key technique that we can use to gain an unshakeable, life changing, testimony when he said that, "The Holy Ghost bears witness of the truth and impresses upon the soul the reality of God the Father and the Son Jesus Christ so deeply that no earthly power or authority can separate him from that knowledge." However, to receive the blessings of the Holy Ghost we need to do what it takes to receive them. Joseph Smith said, "We believe that we have a right to revelations, visions, and dreams from God, our heavenly Father, through the gift of the Holy Ghost, if it so be that we keep his commandments, so as to render ourselves worthy in his sight." So we must be obedient. We also must do the things that we were called here to do. Preach My Gospel says that as we bear testimony often we "seal the truth of the principles or doctrine" we are teaching.
