

Dear Elders and Sisters.

We continue to be gratified by your diligence in the Lord's work. The Lord commanded..."Let every man be diligent in all things" (D&C 75:29). As you will recall "diligence is characterized by steady, earnest, and energetic effort,"

Please help the members follow through with their commitment to read the Book of Mormon in 2010. Many have indicated they plan to complete the Book of Mormon by the time Elder Scott visits Armenia in June. Your encouragement will help them keep their commitment and greatly enhance their spirituality and testimony.

A year or so ago members of the mission presidency and district presidency visited each branch to teach them the importance of daily scripture study. Unfortunately many of our members still do not know how to study the scriptures. The following are some thoughts taken from various remarks of Elder David A. Bednar of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles concerning scripture study. Please feel free to incorporate these principles in your scripture study and to pass this information on to the members.

"The Lord has declared that it is 'His work and His glory to bring to pass the immortality and eternal life of man' (Moses 1:39). He has established His Church to help in this great work. Accordingly, the grand mission The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is 'to invite all to come unto Christ' (D&C 20:59) and 'be perfected in him' (Moroni 10:32). Thus, all that we learn and know and do as disciples of the Savior and as members of His Church, is intended to assist us in responding affirmatively to this supernal invitation" (Elder David A. Bednar).

Why is it so important for me to study the scriptures? First of all, studying the scriptures is important because of the covenants we have made; secondly studying the scriptures is important because of the **direction** we need in our lives; and thirdly studying the scriptures is important because scripture study is a preparation for and prerequisite to receiving personal **revelation**. These are **THREE DOCTRINAL REASONS** why studying the scriptures is so important.

How can I make scripture study more edifying and effective? The following principles apply: Principle 1: Pray. Pray for understanding and invite the help of the Holy Ghost. Principle 2: Work. The scriptural treasures we seek in our lives cannot be borrowed or loaned or obtained secondhand. We must each learn to open the vault door by applying the principle of work. Principle 3: Be consistent. Experience suggests that a specific scheduled time set aside each day and, as much as possible, a particular place for study, greatly increase the effectiveness of our searching in and study of the scriptures. Principle 4: Ponder. Ponder means to consider, contemplate, reflect upon, or think about. Principle 5: Look for **connections** and **patterns** and **parallels** in the scriptures. Principle 6: Write down impressions, thoughts, and feelings.

"I say unto you, my sons, were it not for these things [the scriptures], which have been kept and preserved by the hand of God, that we might read and understand of his mysteries, and have his commandments always before our eyes, that even our fathers would have dwindled in unbelief.

"O my sons, I would that ye should remember that these sayings are true, and also that these records are true...; and we can know of their surety because we have them before our eves.

"And now, my sons, I would that ye should remember to search them diligently, that ye may profit thereby; and I would that ye should keep the commandments of God, that ye may prosper in the land according to the promises which the Lord made unto our fathers" (Mosiah 1:5-7).

May we become master teachers of the doctrines and principles of the gospel by feasting on the scriptures and living our lives in a manner that we may teach with the Spirit and with power and authority.
