

Dear Elders and Sisters,

We have had another great month. I am proud of your hard work and dedication. Let's keep pressing forward with faith. We welcome our new missionaries to Armenia and Georgia. We are happy you are here and we look forward to your contributions to this wonderful work. If you will study (with a purpose), pray (with faith), work hard (with a plan), and obey mission rules (strictly) you will have success. We must consistently study the scriptures as well as the words of the living prophets. Doctrine & Covenants 52:14 states, "...I will give unto you a pattern in all things, that ye may not be deceived; for Satan is abroad in the land, and he goeth forth deceiving the nations----" At the last zone conference we discussed one of the **patterns for success** provided in the Old Testament. Let's review and as we do, please try to **liken** this inspired pattern to your individual situation and circumstance. If you will do this I promise you will find a treasure of knowledge that will serve you well throughout your life.

In the first six chapters of Nehemiah we can find an interesting and valuable **pattern** for success. In chapter one, we learn the Jews had been defeated, scattered, and "the wall of Jerusalem also is broken down, and the gates thereof are burned with fire" (verses 1-2).Nehemiah's response to this desperate situation is interesting and instructive. "And it came to pass, when I heard these words, ... I **sat down** and **wept**, and **mourned** certain days and **fasted**, and **prayed** before the God of Heaven" (verse 4). What is the pattern? After identifying the problem, he sat down and pondered. He wept and mourned because of the gravity of the situation. Then, having done that, he wisely sought for wisdom and guidance through fasting and prayer. Once Nehemiah's prayer and preparation time was over he got up and went to work. By going to work the Lord was able to answer his prayer and the king was inspired to offer needed assistance. Had Nehemiah continued to sit, weep, and mourn and not go to work, I suspect the Lord would not have answered his prayer.

Next we observe another interesting pattern. Of course Satan did not want the wall of Jerusalem to be rebuilt and saw to it that Nehemiah was laughed at, scorned, and despised (Nehemiah 2:19). When those tactics were unsuccessful, the adversary resorted to force and intimidation by conspiring "all of them together to come and to fight against Jerusalem, and to hinder..." the work (Nehemiah 4:8). Despite the best efforts of the adversary, Nehemiah did not lose his focus. He and his men continued the work to rebuild the wall "everyone with one of his hands wrought in the work, and with the other hand held a weapon" (Nehemiah 4:17). Nehemiah remained focused and resolute in purpose despite other distractions including correspondence and messengers sent to persuade and to tempt him. To all who would have him cease the Lord's work he boldly declared... "I am doing a great work, so that I cannot come down: why should the work cease, whilst I leave it, and come down to you?" (Nehemiah 6:2)

Because of Nehemiah's focus and determination he and his men were able to complete a near impossible task in "fifty and two days" (Nehemiah 6:15). "And when it came to pass, that when all our enemies heard thereof, and all the heathen that were about us saw these things, they were much cast down in their own eyes; for they perceived that this work was wrought by God" (Nehemiah 6:16).marvelous story and message. May we look for ways to apply these principles in our own life. By doing so we will enjoy the satisfaction that comes by approaching problems in a systematic and logical way; by involving the Lord in that process; by working our hardest and doing our best; by guarding against the adversary's unrelenting attempts to distract or threaten. If we do these things and follow this pattern, we shall have the privilege of accomplishing many great works "wrought of our God."
