You probably have figured out your new mission president already. Yes, I am an "obedience and work hard" advocate. I have pretty strong views on these topics. For this issue of the mission news letter, I wanted to take time to reiterate some things I spoke of at the last mission conference.

As you will recall, I promised you happiness and success as a missionary if you would follow four simple principles. Study (with a purpose), pray (with faith), work hard (with a plan), and obey mission rules (strictly).

Study (with a purpose). "True doctrine, understood, changes attitudes and behavior. The study of the doctrines of the gospel will improve behavior quicker than a study of behavior will improve behavior" (President Boyd K. Packer, PMG page 19).

> **Pray (with faith).** The Lord said, "And the Spirit shall be given unto you by the prayer of faith; and if ye receive not the Spirit ye shall not teach" (D&C 42:14).

Work Hard (with a plan). "I have often said one of the greatest secrets of missionary work is work! If a missionary works, he will get the Spirit; if he gets the Spirit, he will teach by the Spirit; if he teaches by the Spirit, he will touch the hearts of the people and he will be happy. There will be no homesickness, no worrying about families, for all time and talents and interests

are centered on the work of the ministry. Work, work, work---there is no satisfactory substitute, especially in missionary work" President Ezra Taft Benson, PMG, page 121).

Obey Mission Rules (strictly). The most important rule is the one you are having the most trouble with. "The discipline contained in daily obedience and clean living and wholesome lives builds an armor around you of protection and safety from the temptations that beset you as you proceed through mortality" Elder L. Tom Perry, PMG,

page 122).

We love you and admire you for your goodness.

Elder and Sister Christensen have six wonderful children and nineteen grandchildren who are a source of great friendship and joy.



Message from the Assistants Elder Duke and Elder Moss

Last month President Dunn gave us four keys to missionary work in Armenia. Let's be obedient to the council of our priesthood leaders by focusing on these keys during the month of August.

1. Study hard with a purpose—The key to spiritual, uplifting person and companion studies is planning them during night planning session. During studies the next morning, ask yourselves: Who will we see? What will we teach? What commitments are we giving them? What are the questions they may ask? Which scriptures apply? Your studies should prepare you to answer these questions.

2. Pray with faith—During nightly prayers, every missionary is to review the events of the day with the Lord. Seek confirmation that you have done His will during the day. We must also confirm our plans for the next day during our nightly prayers and ask Him to "consecrate [our] performance...for the welfare of [our] soul." (2 Nephi 32:9)

3. Work hard with a plan—During nightly planning session, use the "Nightly Planning Session (9 steps) sheet given to you by your leaders. Every missionary is to have a planned destination for every hour of their day. Uulu guijing is our last resort, but if you do find yourself doing it then make sure you tell the Lord where you are going, which path you are taking, what your goals are (talking to everybody on the way, getting five contacts, etc.) and ask Him to place people in your path who are preared.

Obey mission rules strictly—Our leaders have counseled us, saying "if you are not obedient then you will always doubt your worthiness to receive miracles from the Lord when you need it." If you can say with confidence that you have been obedient to every rule that day, you will receive the miracle that you desire (for example: New investigators, gift of tongues, mountains moving). The Lord is anxious to bless missionaries with their righteous desires, and He will if we ask iin faith (confidence that we have been obedient.)

If you will pray, plan effectively and be obedient then you will be worthy to receive every blessing that the Lord has in store for you at this time. You will consistently find investigators during the month of August if you follow the counsel given by our priesthood leaders.
