Dear Elders and Sisters,

- Use the "indicator of truth." Use your priesthood. Pray with them.
- Act according to your calling and not your age. For some reason the Lord has seen fit to put the future of the Church on the shoulders of the 19-25 year olds.
- Keep it simple. Focus on essential things. The devil loves complexity.
- Be a "Preach My Gospel Missionary."
- Be strictly obedient. Follow the spirit. Pray with faith and determination.
- Focus your daily and personal study on the needs of your investigators.
- Plan each evening with exactness focusing on your investigators' needs.
- Maintain area books so that you would be happy to show them to the Savior.
- Teach as directed by the Spirit with power and authority.
- You must always follow-up on your investigators' commitments.
- Do everything in your power to get people to attend Sacrament Meeting.

Let's all do our best to follow this inspired council. Furthermore, I promise that if you will study (with a purpose), pray (with faith), work hard (with a plan), and obey mission rules (strictly), you will be instruments in the Lord's hands to bring to pass a great work here in Armenia and Georgia. Please do not just "get by." Always do your best!

We love you and pray for your well-being and continued success.





### Message from the Assistants Elder Moss and Elder Leavitt

This last month we had the great honor of being visited by President Paul of the Europe East Area Presidency. When he visited all of our zones he gave us some wonderful advice. We know that the Lord sent him to our



mission at this time to give us specific counsel on what we can improve and change. He has done so by instructing us to get more investigators to sacrament meeting, talk to more people, and never give up.

As a mission we have had an increase of investigators with a baptismal date, but no increase in the number of investigators attending sacrament meeting. We know that sacrament meeting is one of the greatest opportunities for an investigator to feel the converting power of the Spirit and make friends with church members. Getting our investigators to attend church can be difficult, but here are three suggestions to increase our sacrament meeting attendance. First, go and pick up your investigators before church yourself, or give one of your members the assignment to pick them up. Second, call all of your investigators the night before and remind them to be in church on Sunday. Third, stress frequently the importance of attending church in the meetings with your investigators. We know that as we implement these three simple standards we will increase the number of our investigators attending sacrament meeting.

President Paul emphasized the importance of talking to people wherever we go and reemphasized the standard of ten gospel conversations every day introduced by Elder Ballard. This doesn't mean that we limit ourselves to only ten gospel conversations every day. "And thou must open thy mouth at all times, declaring my gospel with the sound of rejoicing." D & C 28:16

The final point that President Paul emphasized is to "never give up." This does not mean that we should stop thrashing investigators, but rather that we should work harder to resolve our investigator's concerns through the Spirit. This is the whole idea behind thrashing; committing people to change and repent and resolving their concerns with the guidance of the Spirit. Thrashing does not mean dropping an investigator at the first sign of a concern. It does mean that we drop investigators when they stop progressing. We should especially never give up when someone has received a confirmation of truth through the Spirit.

Remembering to follow this inspired counsel will bring peace of conscience and an increase of converted investigators who are being baptized and confirmed.
