

Dear Elders and Sisters,

Thank you for your overwhelmingly positive response to the mission reorganization plan. I know that we will be blessed as a mission for our obedience.



PEMOHT (remodel). Just as old Soviet apartments need to be modernized by adding a little more plaster to the walls every now and then, our mission was recently in need of a reorganization. This particular change will not come by adding plaster and paint to the walls, but rather will come by putting our mission in obedience to the standards which have been set by the prophets regarding missionary work. We know that this reorganization will bless each one of us in a number of different ways.


One way in which we benefit from this reorganization ins having a more intimate learning and teaching atmosphere in all of our training meetings. District meetings, which will take the place of zone meetings, are much smaller in size and better allow us the opportunity of practicing the teaching model on a more personal level.

The privilege of serving in a leadership assignment will increase as eight district leaders are called to mission leadership. This is a challenging and very rewarding experience for all, which the Lord will use to prepare many of his missionaries.

Oftentimes, in this part of the world, we see people do a remodel by stapling an old shack onto the side of their house to allow them room to expand. One of the great advantages of this reorganization is the ability to expand in size and number without the use of sheet metal and cement. The creation of smaller districts and fewer zones will prepare this mission for an increase of missionaries in the future.

Despite the fact that we will not be gathering for mission conferences monthly and mission trips have gone extinct, this reorganization will help us become more dedicated and focused as missionaries. We will not travel nearly as much from our areas, thus allowing us more time to fulfill our purpose in bringing others unto Christ.

Many feel that change is a hard or even unnecessary thing at times, but it is, in reality, one method that the Lord uses to teach us and help us become stronger. These changes have come as an answer to many of our prayers. We can expect great blessings from the Lord if we willingly accept and take advantage of this new structure.
