

Dear Fellow Missionaries,

Paul stated in 1st Corinthians 13:11, "When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things." The difficulty we have in our lives is to discern what are the childish things.

The brethren of the Church, fortified by scriptures, teach us a better way of life. They set down commandments as well as rules for the mission, laws for the Church, and a better pattern of life and living. They teach us how to put away childish things. We may object or even resent these commandments or rules, but this does not alter or change their time-resolved affect. Laman and Lemuel chided and scoffed at Nephi because he would not bend the commandments set down by their father, Lehi. Thus, Nephi was physically beaten while Laman and Lemuel continued on with their childish mannerisms.

The Lord has called and chosen each one of us to establish an eternal destiny. This mission plays a major role in its future outcome. We must therefore cast off our childish things, and conform our lives to the more excellent way of life.

"The Prophet Joseph was 'called and chosen' to give to the world the Book of Mormon and to engage in the ministry. God called him, through the Angel, and when he manifested his willingness to obey the call, he was chosen for the work. The call preceded the election. 'Many are called, but few are chosen.' (Matt. 22:14) 'When I called, ye did not answer.' (Isa. 65:12) The call always precedes the election: 'Give diligence to make your calling and election sure.' (II Peter 1:10) He who is called, is sure of his election, if he obeys the call."

I finished and my companion and I got to our feet. The man and wife slowly took their seats on opposite sides of the small room and I glanced at their faces. Their cheeks were wet with tears. I looked down at the ground in wonderment. What had happened? My question was answered a few minutes later as the lady explained, "I guess that feeling you're talking about is like the feeling we had during the opening prayer. It was as if the Lord had been right next to us telling us that what you were going to explain was true."

Yes. There was something else we brought which I wasn't aware of--the Holy Ghost who is always ready to testify according to our worthiness. Why was his presence manifested on that occasion? I cannot question that it was because of the spiritual preparedness of that senior companion and the help he gave me.

As I look back over my mission, I can think of few missionaries that were so spiritually in tune with the Lord. He was "one" with the Lord. His every word and action denoted it. As the Savior prayed for his disciples He said:

"That they all may be one ; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." (John 17:21)

Dear Fellow missionaries,

We have a time set apart each morning to pray and meditate, but do we really communicate with our Father in Heaven? In a recent missionary conference held here in Guatemala, the question was presented as to whether or not we could have the Holy Ghost with us 100% of the time. Most of us agreed it was possible, but not very probable or easy to do. Here are a few ideas which I feel are very important to us, as servants of our Heavenly Father.

1. Set ourselves straight with the Lord.  
President Clark has said that we must know the will of the Father, and then do it. We must have the courage to really follow through with what He reveals to us.
2. Study--We must know of the truthfulness of the gospel for ourselves before we can effectively tell it to others.
3. Work--We must show our faith by our works.
4. Be happy--We are children of our Father in Heaven and He wants us to be happy in his work.

"And the Spirit shall be given unto you by the prayer of Faith; and if ye receive not the Spirit ye shall not teach."

We all realize the importance of having the Spirit of the Holy Ghost with us, but how can we tell the difference between the whisperings of the Spirit, and our own thinking and reasoning?

A person may profit by noticing the first intimation of the spirit of revelation; for instance, when you feel pure intelligence flowing into you, it may give you sudden strokes of ideas, so that by noticing it, you may find it fulfilled the same day or soon; that is, those things that were presented unto your minds by the Spirit of God, will come to pass; and thus by learning the Spirit of God and understanding it, you may grow into the principle of revelation, until you become perfect in Christ Jesus."

Teachings of the Prophet Joseph Smith

How can we feel this pure intelligence flowing into us?

1. When our minds are free from inner conflict. Inner conflicts do not lead to inspiration. That is why it is so important to fully repent, and have good companion relations.
2. When we have our hearts in our prayers, and are not just merely saying words.
3. When we have a desire to know the will of the Lord. Often we want to know, but just what do we want to know? We must desire to know his complete will, and not just that portion which we want to know.

If we don't strive to employ our minds 100% of the time with good and wholesome positive thoughts, Satan will use any unused portion for evil--to try to bring about our destruction.

To really be effective servants of our Heavenly Father, we must concentrate 100% of our thoughts on our individual goals, and we must strive to have the Holy Ghost as a constant companion 100% of the time. Doing this, I feel is the only way we can accomplish our goals which we have set for ourselves.

DEAR FELLOW MISSIONARIES,

A COMMON COMPLAINT HAS BEEN HEARD DURING THE LAST FEW MONTHS: THE CHALLENGE IS SO HIGH THAT THERE IS NO CHANCE OF ACHIEVING IT; THEREFORE, WHY SHOULD I TRY? IT WON'T MAKE ANY DIFFERENCE IF I DON'T GET CHALLENGE. I'LL JUST WORK HARD AND IF I SHOULD HAPPEN TO GET CHALLENGE, FINE, AND IF NOT I CAN BE SATISFIED BECAUSE I'LL HAVE REACHED THE GOAL THAT I SET OUT TO OBTAIN--JUST WHATEVER I MIGHT HAPPEN TO GET.

ALL OF US HAVE DESIRES TO DO WELL, BUT WE HAVE TROUBLE REACHING OUR GOALS. I HAVE FOUND NAPOLEON HILL'S "SIX WAYS TO TURN DESIRES INTO GOLD" AS EXPRESSED IN THINK AND GROW RICH TO BE VERY EFFECTIVE IN TRANSFORMING THESE DESIRES INTO SUCCESS.

FIRST: FIX IN YOUR MIND THE EXACT NUMBER OF BAPTISMS YOU DESIRE.  
EXAMPLE: 30 BAPTISMS.

SECOND: DETERMINE EXACTLY WHAT YOU INTEND TO GIVE IN RETURN FOR THE CONVERTS YOU DESIRE. EXAMPLE: 70 HOURS OF REALLY EFFECTIVE TIME; 1/2 HOUR PRAYER AND MEDITATION EACH DAY; COMPLETE OBEDIENCE TO MISSION RULES; AND TAKE ADVANTAGE OF EACH OPPORTUNITY TO GET NEW CONVERTS.

THIRD: ESTABLISH A DEFINITE DATE WHEN YOU INTEND TO POSSESS THE BAPTISMS YOU DESIRE. EXAMPLE: APRIL 5, 1970.

FOURTH: CREATE A DEFINITE PLAN FOR CARRYING OUT YOUR DESIRE, AND BEGIN AT ONCE, WHETHER YOU ARE READY OR NOT, TO PUT THIS PLAN INTO ACTION. EXAMPLE: FIND FOUR NEW INVESTIGATORS EACH DAY BY TRACTING OR REFERRALS, GIVE THEM A FIRST LESSON, AND CHALLENGE THEM TO BE BAPTIZED IN ORDER TO ACHIEVE THE GOAL OF SIX BAPTISMS PER WEEK.

FIFTH: WRITE OUT A CLEAR, CONCISE STATEMENT OF THE NUMBER OF CONVERTS YOU INTEND TO ACQUIRE, NAME THE TIME LIMIT FOR THEIR ACQUISITION, STATE WHAT YOU INTEND TO GIVE IN RETURN FOR THE BAPTISMS, AND DESCRIBE CLEARLY THE PLAN THROUGH WHICH YOU INTEND TO OBTAIN THEM. EXAMPLE: BY APRIL 5, 1970, I WILL HAVE 30 BAPTISMS BY OBTAINING SIX EACH WEEK FOR THE NEXT FIVE WEEKS. I INTEND TO PREPARE MYSELF SPIRITUALLY BY STUDYING INDIVIDUALLY AND WITH MY COMPANION ONE HOUR EACH DAY, BY SHOWING COMPLETE OBEDIENCE TO MISSION RULES, AND BY HAVING A DAILY 1/2 HOUR PRAYER AND MEDITATION PERIOD. I WILL DEDICATE 70 REALLY EFFECTIVE HOURS A WEEK TO THE LORD. EACH DAY I WILL FIND FOUR NEW INVESTIGATORS THROUGH TRACTING OR REFERRALS, GIVE THEM THE FIRST LESSON, AND CHALLENGE THEM TO BE BAPTIZED. TO CONCENTRATE ON THE BEST, MY COMPANION AND I WILL EVALUATE THEM DAILY.

I BELIEVE THAT I WILL HAVE THESE BAPTISMS. MY FAITH IS SO STRONG THAT I CAN NOW SEE THEM BEFORE MY EYES. I AM NOW AWAITING TRANSFER OF THEM AT THE TIME AND IN THE PROPORTION THAT I DELIVER THE EFFORT I INTEND TO RENDER IN RETURN FOR THEM.

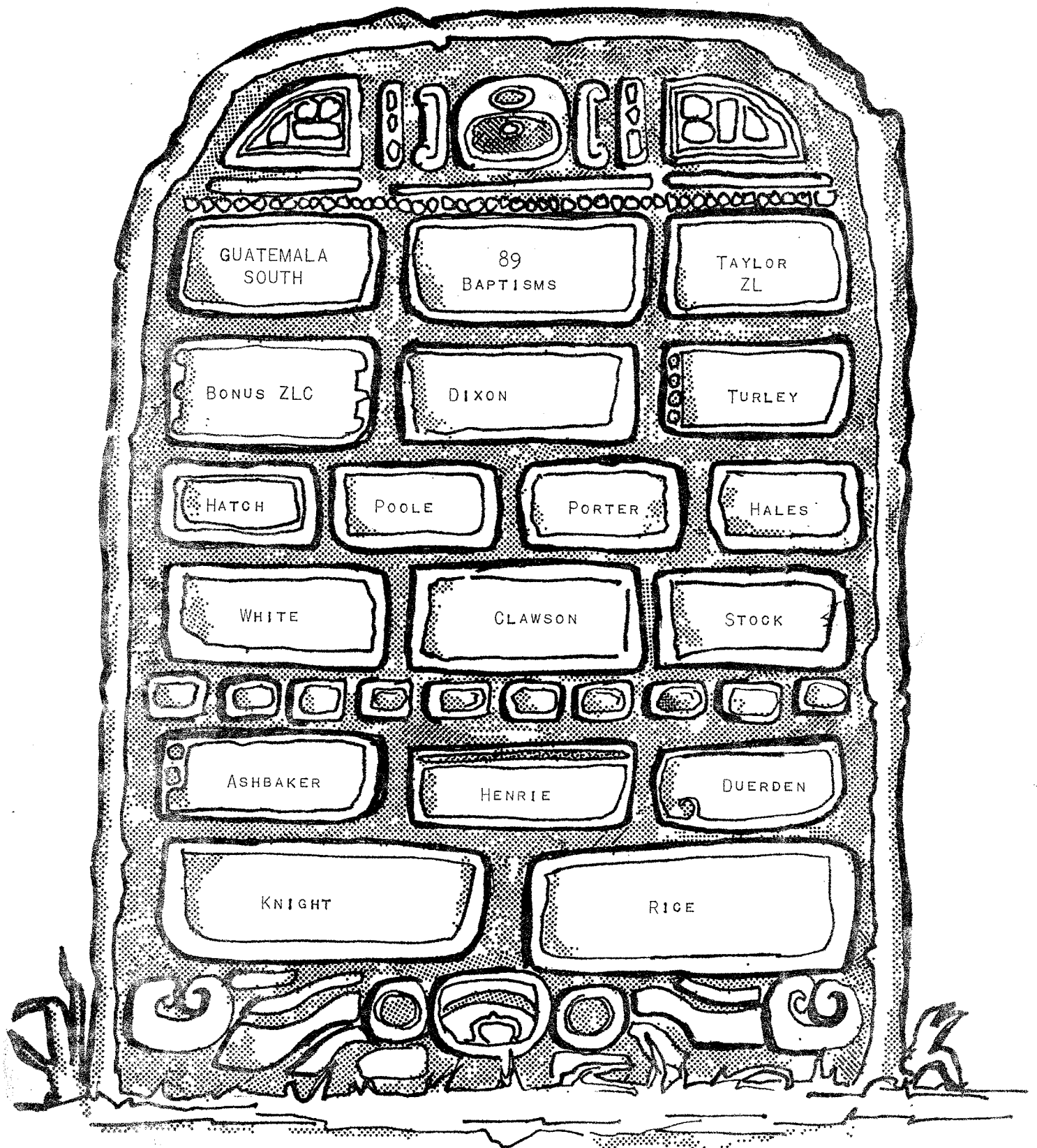
SIXTH: READ YOUR WRITTEN STATEMENT ALOUD, TWICE DAILY, ONCE JUST BEFORE RETIRING AT NIGHT, AND ONCE AFTER ARISING IN THE MORNING. AS YOU READ -- SEE AND FEEL AND BELIEVE YOURSELF ALREADY IN POSSESSION OF THE BAPTISMS.

TO UNDERSTAND THE PURPOSE BEHIND THIS EXERCISE READ CHAPTER IV OF THINK AND GROW RICH. IT WAS WHILE MAKING A FEEBLE ATTEMPT TO EXECUTE THIS PLAN THAT I HAD MY FIRST GLIMPSE OF REACHING MORE THAN THIRTY BAPTISMS AND I ACHIEVED THE GREATEST SUCCESS OF MY MISSION DURING THOSE TWO MONTHS. I PRAY THAT WE MAY ALL STRIVE TO REACH OUR CHALLENGES SO THAT THE LAMANITE PROPHECIES MAY BE FULFILLED.

## AN APPROACH TO MISSIONARY WORK

Excerpts from discourse by Alvin R. Dyer at Salt Lake Mission Home

Attitude is a frame of mind toward missionary work. Fundamentally a mission experience is not a part of the education of the youth of the Church, although it is a recognized fact that the faithful performance of a mission develops traits and characteristics within the missionary that better prepares him for his life's work and future activity in the Church than could be obtained in any other way. But, strictly speaking there is only one purpose for sending missionaries unto people of the world, that of leading souls unto a conviction of the truths of salvation that they too can enjoy the everlasting benefits that come from membership in the Church and kingdom of our Heavenly Father.

When once called to this service the missionary must recognize the solemn obligation to preach the gospel. The Apostle Paul refers to this obligation with this declaration:

"For though I preach the gospel, I have nothing to glory of, for necessity is laid upon me; yea, woe is unto me, if I preach not the gospel."  
(I Cor. 9:16)

In our own day and time the Lord in a revelation to the Prophet Joseph Smith, speaks of those called to be missionaries who fail to open their mouths to preach the gospel, or do so in only a mediocre way.

"But with some I am not well pleased, for they will not open their mouths, but they hide the talent which I have given unto them, because of the fear of man. Woe unto such, for mine anger is kindled against them. And it shall come to pass, if they are not more faithful unto me, it shall be taken away, even that which they have." (D&C 60:2,3)

The Apostle Paul, spoke with true wisdom when he placed this necessity upon the missionary:

"Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel should live of the gospel." (I Cor. 9:14)

Missionaries need a strong conviction of the gospel in order to understand the real objectives of going into the mission field; they should relieve themselves of any attitude or condition that stands in their way of leading their investigators into the waters of baptism.

Fellow missionaries you must believe this, the calling of a missionary has always been noble and important, but to be called in this day and age is an even greater privilege. The time has come, said President David O. McKay, for an expansion of the work of God among the people of the world, such as has never been known before. For this reason missionary work today is more crucial than ever before.

A great need in the mission fields of the Church today, in this most important period of expansion is the type of missionary who first and foremost has a love for his fellowman and a strong desire in his heart to declare the truths of the gospel unto others. To such a missionary will come the inspiration of being guided by the Spirit; who by virtue of his own thinking and living is worthy of the companionship of the Holy Ghost. With this power of conviction he will be able to awaken interest in the hearts of good people, leading to conversion.

The work of the Lord has opened up of late with great strides and is going forward. We must realize that this work has entered its final preparation for the day of the Lord's Second Coming. Knowing this, we ought not let a single day go by without doing the work the way the Lord wants it done. Missionaries should not hesitate to challenge and testify of the gospel truths as revealed.

It is the responsibility of every Elder to see that each baptismal slip that is turned in to the ZL is filled out on the back side in the following manner:

- 1) Whether baptism is male or female
- 2) Age of baptism
- 3) Whether baptism is:

- a) Individual - Not part of a complete family baptized or does not himself complete a family
- b) Complete Family - All eligible members of family baptized at same time. For example:  
Man, woman, and 3 children baptized together. Mark: "COMPLETE FAMILY" on top of father's card only and include number of members which were baptized.

- c) Family Completed - Person(s) that when baptized leave no one in that family living at home and over 9 years old who could be baptized, thus completing a family

4) When a District Missionary is responsible for the baptism, write "District Missionaries" on the back of the slip.
