Dear Fellow Missionaries,

Now that the May Program has been introduced into the Mission it is important that all of us catch the importance of employing all the instructions that have been given us. The intent of this program is to bridge the gap that exists between the eccesiastical work and the proselyting program of the mission. Through joining forces we might accomplish greater results in the field of proselyting, fellowshipping, priesthood advancement, and preparation of our branches and districts for wards and stakes. The following is a formula that was introduced into the program for the month of May and on the proselyting phase of this work. It pertains mainly to the missionary as he perfects his course of gathering souls in the gospel of Jesus Christ. Therefore remember the following:

- 1. Prepare yourselves. D & C 11:21.
- 2. Testify to the world. Matthew 28:18-19, D & C Section 4, and D & C 24:4-6.
- 3. Unite families in the church through carrying the gospel to partmember families. D & C 68:25-28.
- 4. Baptize. D & C 20:37.
- 5. Train Priesthood Leadership.
 D & C Section 107.

As regarding the ecclesiastical cooperation in proselyting matters of the mission, it is essential that we in cooperation with the Branch Presidents complete the audit sheets, the March sheets, and the branch lists. Equally as essential is that we as missionaries visit the 10 families of those who have separated themselves from church activity, and that we teach in these visits the 8 lessons which have been designated to reactivate and rejuvenate these disadent members. The desired times for these visits are Monday evenings, Wednesday and Friday mornings. It is essential that we re-teach these people as if they were inhabitants of some "dark continent".

May the Lord bless you in your labors as you launch forth in your assignments is our sincere prayer.



A LETTER FROM PAUL TO YOU

My name is Paul, a follower of Jesus Christ, our hope, and God our Savior. I write this note to those who have been called to serve their country in the defense of righteousness. May grace, mercy, and peace which come from God and Jesus Christ rest upon you right now.

I want to tell you something I have said before: Wherever you go in this new adventure, stay true to the doctrine of the Church, for you will be tempted to stray from it. Don't get all mixed up by endless discussions of theories and speculations. These result only in loss of faith. Strengthen your life by living ordered lives of faith. Responsible Christians express a love that is genuine. Certain persons have wandered away from this admonition and have become so involved in sinful habits that they have become missionaries for evil, without understanding what they are saying and doing.

You know as well as I that the Bible sets forth good principles for you; in it you will find many "dos and dont's" for your life as a

disciple.

I want you to know how much I thank God for the daily strength He gives me in my attempt to live the Christian life. I thank Christ, in like manner, for He considered me worthy to witness for him in lands far from my familiar surroundings. I believe He has called you to do the same, as you serve His Church. God has called you to become mature in your faith and to spread the good news of Jesus Christ through your witness, Even though you may have done many things to disgrace such a call from God, He had granted you purity of mind and heart and soul for the new task that is yours now, God's marvelous grace poured down upon you like a shower of water during a cloudburst. And now you can report what has happened to you; namely, that God sent Jesus into this world to bring salvation to His children and having received such unmerited mercy you have a great story to tell the nations. To God be given praise for this transformation that has occured in your life.

And so, I put this word to you now--in keeping with the commission that you have received from God, let God be your strength, your way, and your companion. Let Him wage into conflict with you; hold onto your faith in His presence; it will be your only hope during times of great need. Never toss your confidence in Him overboard as some people have

I urge your parents, friends, and church acquaintances to enter into a covenant with you as you embark. Be assured of their prayerful support as they intercede for you and thank God for you. May their desire and yours be that God will bestow upon you a special measure of his peace and serenity. Such should be the hope of all of you, for God asks you to carry on anothers burdens. God wants all men to experience Him for themselves, and thereby know truth. You may meet men who will say there are many gods, but I affirm to you that there is only one God. You may become acquainted with fellows who will laugh at your belief in Jesus the Savior, but that does not make Him any less Savior. Jesus indeed gave himself for all men everywhere, whether or not they were willing to accept that as a fact. It was for that very same reason that He has called you now to witness in strange places.

My wish for you is this: Wherever you go, Wherever you are, do not make a fool of yourself by losing your self-control. Don't engage in any affair that will later bring heartache and pain. Look upon all persons as those whom God loves fine persons with whom you can share your testimony in and about God.

So I say to you in closing: A great treasure has been entrusted to you. Guard it well, but share it with all you meet. Avoid godlessness and activities that bring you inward shame; set your eyes on Christ and you will not miss the mark towards which your life is being directed.



Elder Ronald Smith left with us a few suggestions to help us work more effectively as missionaries:

- 1. Fix up the Branch; No one wants to be a member of a poorly organized branch. You may want to work a little extra with the Branch President, organize the Mutual, this doesn't mean working with members to solve family problems.
- 2. Fix up the Chapel; A clean, well painted chapel is a drawing card to all baptised members as well as investigators.
- 3. Work effectively; New Members are the most enthusiastic members and the best source for references, work with them, make visits with them. Don't stay long periods of time with 1/2 doubtful investigators the first time around. Try to be working with good investigators, it keeps your spirit up.
- 4. Teach effectively; The theme of each lesson is baptism. Make certain that the people understand that is why you are there. Stay on the lesson and leave when it is over. Do not argue. Be Tactful on challenging and testifying, be sincere, don't preach.
- 5. Be friendly, or in other words, love the people. Care whether they get baptized or not. If you are going to talk about things other than the lesson, don't do it during lesson time. Notice the children and the house, and make pleasant comments about them. Always show up for every visit, and be on time.
- 6. Be positive. Don't ask the investigator to pray to see which church is right, ask him to pray for a testimony of the truth—fulness of the Gospel, and the strength to be baptised. If they ask if they can wait, tell them NO. Always keep smiling, have patience, and read Alma 26:27 often.

ife," said Benjamin Disraeli, "is a tumble-about thing of ups and downs,"-with its sick hurry, its divided aims," Matthew Arnold added. There are times when all of us feel overburdened, with debts, with obligations, so many things undone, so many undone things to do-worries, problems, and sometimes our share, it seems, of sorrows. And we wonder how we can be everywhere we ought to be, do all we ought to do, meet the obligations, and carry the weight of our worries, as we seem to divide ourselves in too many different directions, too many ways at once-not feeling that we are completing or disposing of or quite in control of anythingjust a reshuffling of papers, a reshuffling of problems. To all of this, some gentle advice from an unnamed source proposes the "one-at-a-time" approach: "Mountains viewed from a distance," it says, "seem to be unscalable, but they can be climbed, and the way to begin is to take the first upward step. From that moment the mountains are less high. The slopes that seem so steep from a distance seem to level off as we near them." Any task in life is easier if we approach it with the one-at-a-time attitude. One step-a beginning: doing something about something, beginning to see something get goinggives assurance that we are on our way and that the solving of problems is possible. To cite a whimsical saying: "If you chase two rabbits, both of them will escape." No one is adequate to everything all at once. We have to select what is important, what is possible, and begin where we are, with what we have. And if we begin-and; if we keep going-the weight, the worry, the doubt, the depression will begin to lift, will begin to lighten. We can't do everything always, but we can do something now. and doing something will help to lift the weight and fessen the worry." "The beginning," said Plato, "is the most important part."
