Dear Fellow Missionaries,

With the passing of each day, we realize more than ever the impact of the gospel upon our lives and the need to live closer to our Heavenly Father. We also realize the great desires the Father has to reveal his will unto us as we labor to build his kingdom.

The peaceable things of the kingdom come to us through revelation; the assurance of our calling and the testimony of the truthfulness of this gospel come to us through revelation. We must pray to our Father continually for his help and guidance in order to be endowed with the great gifts and blessings.

He waits upon us to ask in faith in order to reveal His will to us.

'Nearly always—so far as I know, always—revelation has come because a request for help has been made. "Ask and ye shall receive." Gratuitous revelation is unheard of. There may be times when the Lord, who knows our hearts, knows that we have need of something beyond our reach, and bestows on us that which we desire before the wish is expressed, but even then the need has been felt. We ask for something. He hears, and marvelous revelation is given.

Revelation and human need travel side by side. Revelation is not far away from us. Revelation deals with me and my needs as they are today. That means that revelation to the church or to an individual is a gradual unfolding of a great truth. The gospel did not come as one great book of doctrine given all at one time; but as needs arose, and questions were asked; and little by little the full gospel of salvation was given to the church.'

(John A. Widstoe, "Modern Revelation and Modern Questions, "Descret News--Church section, Jan 28, 1939--)

"Wherefore, he is possessor of all things; for all things are subject unto him, both in heaven and on the earth, the life and the light, the spirit and the power, sent forth by the will of the Father through Jesus Christ, his son.

"But no man is possessor of all things except he be purified and cleansed from all sin.

"And if ye are purified and cleansed from all sin, ye shall ask whatsoever you will in the name of Jesus and it shall be done." (Doctrine and Covenants 50: 26-29)

May the Lord's continued blessings remain with each of you, is our prayer.

Doubting not God, nor the power of the Priesthood, but glancing upward, hands clasped between his legs, he listens to the aging woman. She says she has faith in Christ, in the Church, in the elder-she wants to be healed. The young man breathes deeply, pendering the needs of the Spirit. He doesn't warry about the old lady; he worries about his own worthiness. He has been an active member all his life. He has been a good missionary. He knows he has a testimony of faith. Nevertheless, he has yet to perceive any more of a burning sensation during his prayers than he has felt when he stands for the national anthem. But, because of her faith the elder consents—outwardly confident, inwardly reluctant.

That night he reads of the mosquito-ridden swamps in Nauvoo as they sucked away the lives of the impoverished Saints. For days the Elders had been administering without ceasing, and without success. Then came Joseph. Walking among his brethren he was filled with the Spirit as he healed hundreds on both sides of the Mississippi. Soon he was encircled by a group of the brethren, including some of the Twelve, to whom the youthful prophet gave this ultimatum:

"It is time that such things ended. Let the Elders either obtain the power of God to heal or let them cease to minister the forms without the power." (Life and Travels of Parley P. Pratt.p. 294)

He leans back frustrated. His mind is then made to remember the challenge given by a latter-day General Authority:

"Revelations are not reserved for a limited few or for those called to positions of importance in the Church. It is not being a bishop, a stake president, or an aposite that makes revelation and salvation available. Rather it is personal righteousness; it is keeping the commandments; it is seeking the Lord while he may be found." (B. R. McConkie, Gen. Conf. Oct. 1969)

The penetrating words of President McKay cause him to examine his responsibility:

"I testify to you, as I have done before, that you leaders, you priesthood bearers, may so live that you may receive impressions and direct messages through the Holy Ghost. The veil is thin between these who hold the priesthood and those on the other side of the veil." (Gen. Conf. Oct. 1988)

The personal challenge given by Elder McConkie is now his own:

What the Prophet Joseph Smith saw; and believed, and knew will not suffice. True, his revelations make salvation available to me; they open the door. But I must see and believe and know for myself.

"I must know God.

"I must learn the truths of salvation.

"I must feel the power of his priesthood.

"I must receive the gifts of his Spirit,

"I must be born again.

"I must receive revelation."

(Gen. Conf. Oct. 1969)

These testimonies of prophets, living and dead, are catalysts to his desire for inspiration. The young man is now sure. He has the power if he is righteous. The miracle of revelation is his privilege if he obeys all the commandments. As he seeks to know the will of God the scriptures become increasingly significant. They will lead him to revelation—to know the will of God that he might OBEY and CECEIVE THE PROMISE.

While confined in a dungeon-like cell in Missouri, Joseph Smith penned an inspired line concerning the human soul.

"Thy mind, D man!, if thou wilt lead a soul unto salvation must stretch as high as the utmost heavens and search into and contemplate the darkest abyss and the broad expanse of eternity — Thou must commune with God."

I have often marveled at the supreme dedication of that prophet. I marvel that he, in the midst of sorrow and despair, would have his mind centered not on his own misfortune but rather on the worth of the human soul and its salvation. To me, Joseph Smith exemplified charity in the greatest sense. His love was "so centered in righteousness that he had no other desire than to save his own soul and souls of all those around him."

It quite naturally came to my mind how I, as a missionary, met the qualifications of charity. Naturally encountering a deficiency, I asked what was necessary to build that principal and make it stronger. I remembered a statement told to me at one time: if you desire to be a certain way, you should act as though you were already that way. It seemed to fit.

Do we as missionaries seek people because we love them? Do we go to a door with nothing but that person's salvation on our mind? I can answer for myself; many times I haven't. Next question. Should we approach people with that attitude? Again, I answer for myself. Yes. I sincerely believe so.

All easily said- true. The application of principle, of bourse more difficult; but, the best never comesceasy. To the principles come the greatest opposition. Apply the principle; allow the Lord to shower down his blessings. He requires great effort and sacrifice on our part. He wants to be convinced that we want what we ask for and are deserving of it; but, his promise is eternal and unfailing.

"Let thy Bowels also be full of <u>Charity</u> towards all men, and to the household of faith, and let virtue garnish thy thoughts unceasingly: then shall thy confidence wax strong in the presence of God: and the doctrine of the priesthood shall distill upon thy soul as the dews from heaven." (Doctrine and Covenants 121: 45)

What greater promise could we have than to be in the presence of our Beloved Father?

Washington Irving said, "little minds are tamed and subdued by misfortunes but great minds rise above it." And we are told in the D&C sec. 4"...O ye that embark in the service of God, see that ye serve him with all your heart, Might, mind, and strength, that ye may stand blameless before God at the last day." This is the beiling point. "The gospel promises no crown without a cross, no tiumph without a battle. Its light will show us through, not around, our troubles." Hugh B. Brown.

Determination will lead us to our goal. "Many great men started from the depth of the valley. One started out in a log cabin and become the chief executive of the land. His name was Lincoln. Cripple a man and you have a Sir Walter Scott. Bury him in the snows of Valley Forge, and you have a George Washington. Afflict him with asthma until as a boy he lies choking in his father's arms, you have a Theodore Roosevelt. Deafen him and you have a Beethoven."

Let missionary work challenge you. You are a missionary, not by an unkind destiny to crush, but to challenge you.

"...But this life is the time in which men are to repent. Do not let any of us imagine that we can go down to the grave not having overcome the corruptions of the flesh and then lose in the grave all our sins and evil tendencies. They will be with us. They will be with the spirit when separated from the body.

"It is my judgment that any man or woman can do more to conform to the laws of God in one year in this life than they could do in ten years when they are dead. The spirit only can repent and change, and then the battle has to go forward with the flesh afterwards. It is much easier to overcome and serve the Lord when both flesh and spirit are combined as one. This is the time when men are more pliable and susceptible. We will find when we are dead every desire, every feeling will be greatly intensified. When clay is pliable it is much easier to change than when it gets hard and sets.

"This life is the time to repent. That is why I presume it will take a thousand years after the first resurrection until the last group will be prepared to come forth. It will take them a thousand years to do what it would have taken but three-score and ten to accomplish in this life.

"When we go out of this life, leave this body, we will desire to do many things that we cannot do at all without the body. We will be seriosly handicapped, and wo will long for the body; we will pray for that early reunion with our bodies. We will know then what advantage it is to have a body.

"Then, every man and woman who is putting off until the next life the task of correcting and overcoming the weakness of the flesh are sentencing themselves to years of bondage, for no man or woman will come forth in the ressurrection until they have completed their work, until they have overcome, until they have done as much as they can do." (Melvin J. Ballard, "Three Degrees of Glory")

Remember that when you fill out baptismal papers there is a small white FP-110 card which needs to be filled out and sent in with it. It's the responsibility of the DL to see this is done. If it isn't done, the baptism will probably be accredited to Elder Fugal. In that he has to fill out the card when not filled out.

Before baptizing any person with Negro blood, be sure and talk to President Clark.
