Dear Missionary Companions.

President Spencer W. Kimball, acting president of the Council of the Twelve, was the presiding general authority at the Guatemala Stake Conference, held on September 4 and 5. Although his visit was specifically to train and instruct the stake officiels; and preside over the quarterly stake conference, he requested as Saturday, morning meeting with those missionaries who were working in and near Guetemala, City. We are sorry that time would not permit a general missionary meeting where all missionaries could have felt the epirit of this modern day prophet. In an attempt to share with each and everyone of you a few thoughts Elder Kimball expressed in the testimony meeting held with about 60 misslonaries, I have reviewed my notes and those of others in order to briefly outline some of his instructions to us. First, let me say that Brother Kimball is the chairman of the missionary committee of the Church and, consequently, loves missionaries and missionary work. He and Brother Thomas Fyans, regional representative for Guatemala, and traveling companion of Elder Kimball, had just returned from the first Regional General Conference of the Church, held in Manchester, England. They both mentioned how successful this conference was and the thrill it was to have President Smith there to preside over this historic occasion.

The meeting with our missionaries was held in the Ward 2 chapel and consisted of testimonies given by a few missionaries, primarily those who were about to terminate their missions, and then words of counsel and instructions by Brother Fyans and Brother Kimball. The following comments were made by President Kimball:

When President Kimball returns home from a trip, he always empties out his coat pockets on the desk and goes through the things he has collected and analyzes them. Some things he throws away and other things he will file away for future use. What we should do as missionaries, even before we leave on our missions, is go through our lives and clean out those habits that are not becoming to us, and file the good ones. This shouldn't only be a two year plan, but it should last us for 80 years, the rest of our lives. It should be a permanent plan of life.

To help us in the above challenge, President Kimball gave the following:

Make every day a full, glorious, abundant day. Pray to be effective, and worthwhile in someone's life.

Don't ever place yourself in a position that will influence the rest of your life negatively.

Pay an honest tithing! Tithing money is sacred. Don't allowathe habit of notapaying tithing during your mossion to carry over after you return home and commence earning money again!

Obey all laws, religious, national, state and you will be free!

Gain an attitude of totalness and dedication to the gospel.

Brother Kimball also gave advice to the returning missionaries soon to be home with their families:

Go home and remain a missionary—you are not released, it is only another move.

Avoid being eccentric, radical, crude and those things that might breed a bad attitude. Be conservative, be cautious.

When you go home, and give your returning address to your ward, bear your testimony as you have never done before. Don't tell silly, funny stories. Bear your testimony!

Keep your activity in the church at a high level and go to the temple whenever possible.

The most important step for you in the future is marriage. After a clean and wholesome courtship, finding the right mate and marrying him or her so you can bring the waiting spirit children into your marriage is your next mission. This is more important than earning a college degree or securing a job. Date and select a partner with good "common horse-sense." Someone who is high-minded, clean, and wants a big family. Remember, you are marrying for your children! Don't take pills! Don't wait to have children! Don't have your wife work to put you through school!

Put your family life on the high plane where it belongs. You are going into marriage to prepare your selves to become gods. We can never assume to be a god until we are worth to be a god.

If you never convert a soul but yourself on your mission, you've accomplished something important!

Keep the commandments.

That, my dear missionary companions, is a brief summary of a few selected thoughts given to us by Elder Spencer W. Kimball. In bearing his testimony in one of the meetings with the mission presidency, he reconfirmed his knowledge that we are members of THE Church of Jesus Christ (D&C 1:30). May the Lord bless each and everyone of us in our respective callings and find us living the gospel every day of our lives.

Dear Fellow Missionaries,

No matter how we come into a mission, there are only two ways we can leave it. We can leave questioning our original purpose in coming, shaky in faith and testimony, lacking in self-confidence, before the Lord, somewhat bitter about the last two years, and eternally wishing we could have done it differently; or, we can be happy about the job done, comfortable with ourselves and with the Lord, confident toward the future and with the valuable knowledge that we've brought inestimable happiness into many people's lives.

No exterior source can really determine which feeling we take home with us—it's a completely personal thing. But if we could just leave a few ideas with you, they would be:

- 1) We are chosen representatives of Jesus Christ. Just the knowledge of who He really was and the power and majesty we represent should be a constant source of strength to us all.
- 2) Of all the things we've been involved with so far in our lives, this mission has to be the most important. Worrying about the past or the future is such a waste when our efforts should be 100% directed to now. The time goes by so quickly, and even faster when we're working as we should.

At the end of the mission, we get a chance to look it all over and see what it was all about: it isn't the movies, the paseos, or the ball games. It's the warm feeling of the Holy Ghost when we testify of the truthfulness of the Gospel; it's the happiness of watching a family change and realize the becuty of the Church; it's the growth our families or loved ones at home have experienced through our influence; and it's the added maturity, testimony and confidence with which we go home. Before long, the mantle of authority fells from our shoulders and the opportunity is lost, but the memory of what we did stays with us forever.

We sincerely hope and pray we can all realize those things and put our values where they belong. The mission can be a great experience, and should be "the best two years of our life." It depends on you.

Some of our families and members will need a little bit of pushing, but if you do this and also teach them how to save the money and explain the eternal values of going to the temple, you will feel very happy when you see them returning from the temple.

OFFICE MEMOS

One of the mission projectors recently underwent some repairs, and, when we picked it up, the repairman said he had found quite a few things wrong with it, apparently due to poor handling by those who have been using it. The projector was originally sent to the repairman after having been seriously damaged when it was plugged into a 220-volt circuit. This mishap resulted in a large repair bill for the Church.

We ask that all missionaries use extreme care when using or handling the mission movie projectors. A short set of simple instructions will hereafter be sent with the projectors so future accidents can be avoided; it is hoped that all missionaries using the movie equipment will fallow these instructions. Also, it will be easier on the projectors if we tell the people at bus lines to please be careful when shipping them as they are sent from place to place.

With the increased emphasis being placed on Open Houses, the movie projectors are in more demand than ever. For this reason, we also ask that missionaries wanting to use this equipment reserve of woth the Mission Scoretory as soon as possible. There are non-mally enough projectors to go around; sometimes, however, an Open House or an Investigator Fireside cannot be held because the missionaries have taken for granted that a projector will be available, only to find it reserved by someone else. If we will ask for the projectors far enough in advance, then handle them with care, they will be of greater use to all of us.


