Dear Fellow Missionaries:

In his book "Introduction to the Gospel," Bennion states "In the Ninth Century B. C., the Prophet Elijah called all Israel and the prophets of Baal together at Mount Carmel for a most dramatic test of religious truth." Elijah challenged the prophets of Baal, as they called upon their god, to work miracles, only to see them fail. Then Elijah offered sacrifice unto the Lord to the which there was complete acceptance.

Our greatest struggle in life is to choose between two opinions and the most important moments of our lives come when we are called to choose between the selfless dedication to the Lord or follow the works of the modern day Baal. In the mission, the final point we have to decide is whether we are going to be missionaries of complete dedication or if Baal is going to have a place in our lives.

With complete dedication there is a price to pay. The prices are opposition, struggle, deprivation, pain, sickness, and sometimes severe mental suffering, but no act of true dedication goes unnoticed by our Savior. The Prophet Joseph, on one occasion, observing the tremendous struggles and opposition that came to the Quorum of Twelve Apostles as they set forth to carry the restored work unto all nations (on January, 1836) uttered the following:

"I saw the Twelve Apostles of the Lamb, who are now upon the earth, who hold the keys of this last ministry, in foreign lands, standing together in a circle, much fatigued, with their clothes tattered and feet swollen, with their eyes downward, and Jesus standing in their midst, and they did not behold Him. The Savior looked upon them and wept."

There is not a thing that anyone of you would not do to know that the Savior was equally concerned with each one of you. It is my opinion that he is watching over this mission and is concerned with the lives of his chosen people upon the face of this land among whom we are laboring. I feel that his concern is here more than any time before-- that he is going before our paths leading us to the elect of these lands and because of his concern and because of his presence among us, we are enjoying great success.

Missionaries, stay close to Him. Pray always. Seek the constant companionship of the Spirit. Sacrifice unto God and cast off the things of Baal. Halt not between two opinions. Dedicate yourself completely to the Lord,

Discouragement is said to be one of the most effective tools of the devil. And "despondency," said de Witt Talmage, "is the most unprofitable feeling a man can indulge in." All of us begin many good things that, because of discouragement, we fail to finish-- and so lose time in false starts and premature stops. And if anyone wanted to see us waste our lives, he wouldn't have to tempt us to do something obviously sinful. He would only have to discourage us to the point of giving up doing what we should be doing and to make us feel that we were failures. Thus much of life would be wasted. And yet discouragement comes to all of us. No one ever conquered a bad habit without discouragement and without earnest enduring effort. No one ever acquired an adequate education or any real competence without discouragement and purposeful practice and persistence. No one has ever lived without discouragement. We grow by doing, by enduring, and by not giving in to the first difficulty. As to "the refusal to ...surrender to despondency ... Whatever the situation," said Dr.

Fosdick, "... and however ... disheartening it may be, it is a great hour when a man ceases adopting it as an excuse for despondency and tackles himself as the real problem. No mood need be his master ... remember others.

Emotions are contagious ... (and) can infect a whole household." As

"the day returns and brings us the petty round of irritating concerns and duties, help us to play the man," pleaded Robert Louis Stevenson, "help ... us to go ... on our business all this day, bring us

to our resting beds weary and content and undishonored, and grant us in the end the gift of sleep." And finally, as Ian

Maclaren said it: "Let us be kind to one another, for most of us are fighting a hard battle"

*** Notice to Viejos Planning: There is a rumor going around that the Pan American people will overlook the fact that your luggage is noticeably overweight. This, of course, isn't true. There is a very small discount that some of the officials offer, so stay as close to the 44 lb. mark as you can or you will go home broke!

*** Remember Mission Standards still hold that the correct way to wear your hair is on your head. If you find your hair slipping from your head down to your chin, reach down and pull it back up where it belongs.

*** A lot of times elders keep their passports upon entering into Guatemala when they get a move from Salvador. All passports should be turned into the office upon entering Guatemala. There are many things that are done to the passports in the office or at Migrations. Please turn in all passports into Guatemala, or make arrangements with the Public Relations Director so your passport can be accounted for-- otherwise you will have problems getting across the border when you take that illegal paseo!



*** In towns where there is a radio station broadcasting our tapes, the D. L. is in charge of the distribution. This is very important and must be kept up or the free time we have will be lost. So please, you D. L. s, keep in touch with the Public Relations Director.

*** As long as the male members in our ward or branch hold the priesthood, let's give them more opportunity to exercise their authority by letting them baptise, confirm, give blessings, and other ordinances they are authorized to perform.
