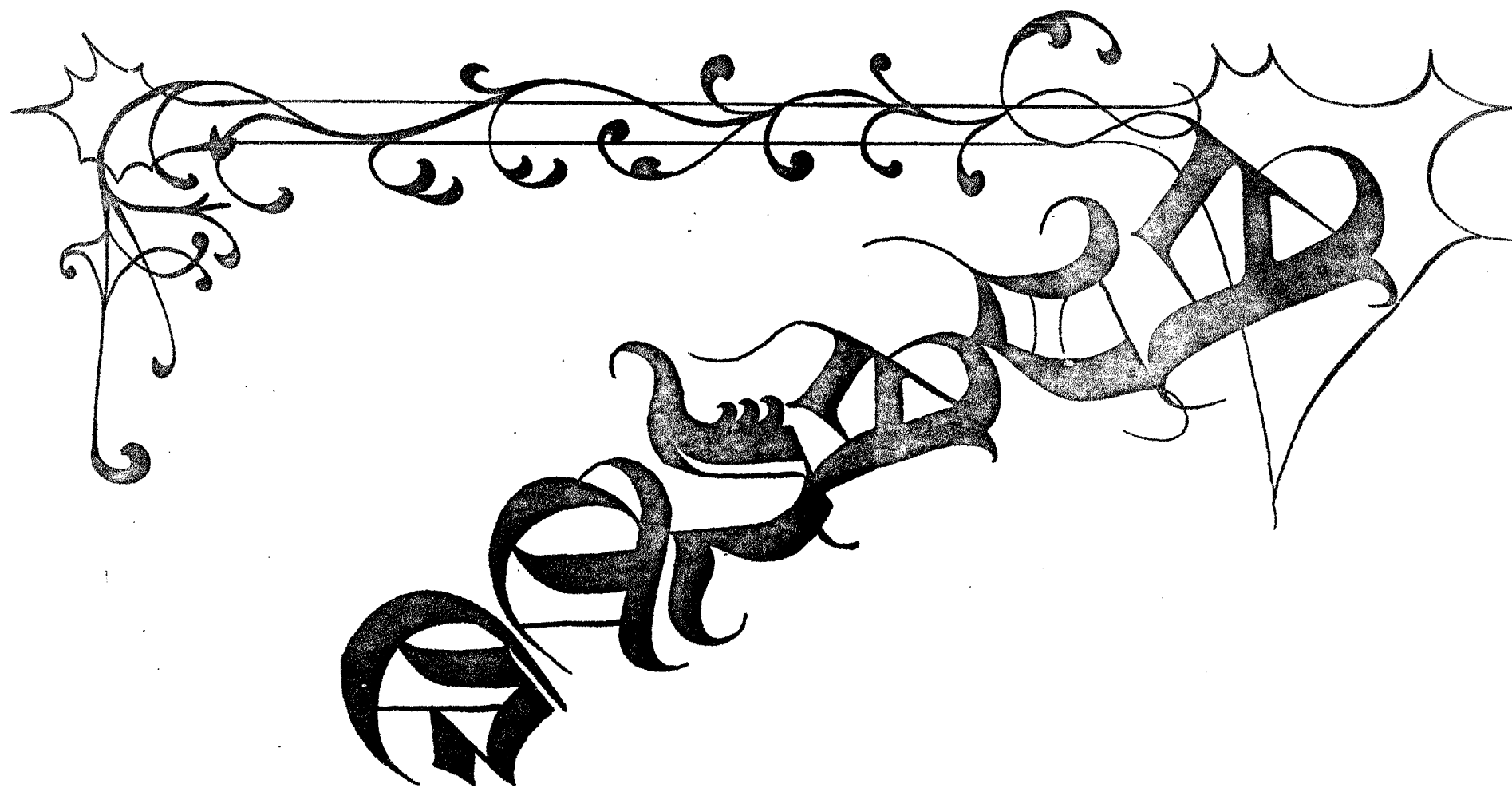



... see that ye serve him ...

Dear Fellow Workers,

There is a very interesting comparison that can be drawn up between the amount of "serving the Lord" we did in the month of October and the amount we did during November, and the number of people converted to the gospel of Christ. Figures many times fail to communicate the personal aspect or the problems involved in doing a certain job, but they are a concise guide to efforts and totals. Perhaps it would be well to examine a few of these totals and see just how well we have served the Lord.

In the month of October, the average elder put in a 60 hour week. He gave 11 lessons a week, and ended up with 2.7 baptisms, or nearly 3 per elder. In the month of November, the average elder put in 49 hours weekly, gave 6 lessons, and ended up with 1.3 baptisms, far from the 6.7 per elder necessary if we are going to reach our challenge of 1,000 as a mission.

Looking at those figures, it kind of makes one think. Is there such a big difference between 49 hours a week and 60 hours a week; between 6 lessons a week and 11 lessons a week? Or maybe by serving the Lord that extra bit, He helped us. Maybe it's not so much totals, but attitude. Did we honestly strive to "serve the Lord" as much as we could have? Did we put forth our whole, honest effort in striving to attain our goals?

I'm sure that all of us, at one time or another, have said to ourselves, "If the Lord were to give me a personal revelation, I'm sure that I would be a better missionary." Perhaps what we do not realize is that we DO have personal revelation today. It is through this same personal revelation that we received our mission calls. It is through this same personal revelation that we stop at a certain door and knock on it instead of at the neighboring house, and the people are baptized. The will of the Lord doesn't change, and His will is expressed in Section 4 of the D&C, a section that we were all required to learn, but that perhaps has become a little rusty in our minds. In part it states "O ye that embark in the service of God, see that ye serve him with all your heart, might, mind, and strength..." If we still need something more specific, we read in D&C section 18, where it states, "...And now, behold, I say unto you, that the thing which will be of the most worth unto you will be to declare repentance unto this people, that you may bring souls unto me, that ye may rest with them in the kingdom of my Father."

Missionary work is a most noble ambition and important calling, not only for our investigators but also for us. Let us all strive to put a bigger serving of "serving the Lord" into our work, especially this month, during the time of Christmas spirit and New Year's resolutions. Perhaps all of us could just pause a moment and reflect why we are here and realize just how precious the time is that we spend serving our Father.

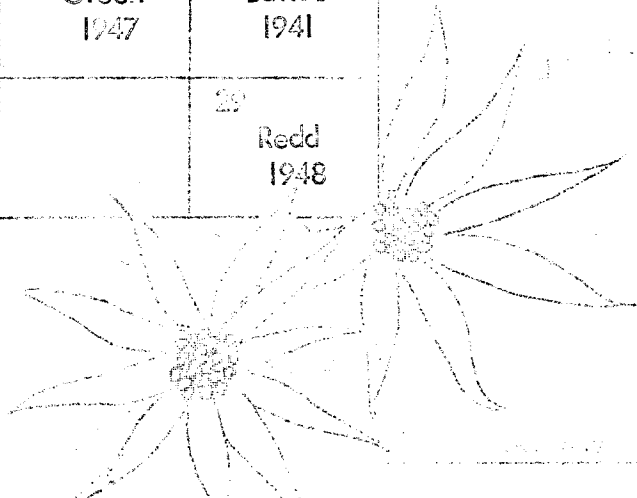

What does Christmas mean to the

That is Christmas.



We have noted some errors in filling out the membership cards in the various branches of the mission. Please take note of the following suggestions:

1. The membership cards should be **COMPLETELY** filled out. That means the full name, the date, and the places should be included. If the date of birth is not known, it should be approximated.
2. When you missionaries fill out the baptismal papers, you should ask the candidates how to spell their names in order to avoid words or names incorrectly spelled. Did you know that a name may be written several different ways? For example: "Rodrigo" and "Rodríguez". So no matter how strange the spelling of the name is, spell it the way the candidate wants it. Got that? Also, the names of both the candidate and the missionaries performing the ordinances should be written out in full. You should **NEVER** use a letter or an abbreviation in place of a full name. For example, write it "Juan López Gómez" instead of "Juan López G." or any such combination. Every month we get papers with only the middle initial of the elder who baptized or confirmed. Let's get it straight!
3. Addresses should always be complete. Even last month, several baper papers came into the office with only the names of the town on them. That is ridiculous.
4. The names of the people baptized should be written on the membership cards according to the name of the father if the person is either recognized **OR** if the parents are married. If the person is not recognized by his father, and his parents are not married, his name is written under his mother's name. Let's have an example so everyone can get it straight once and for all. Suppose that the father's name is "Pedro López", and the mother's name is "María Gómez". If the parents are married **OR** the father recognizes the child, the name would be "Juan López (Gómez)". If the child is not recognized, the name on the record would be "Juan Gómez".

Hopefully, the question of how to fill out baper papers and membership cards has now been answered forever. Let's keep these instructions in mind and follow them in making out our papers.
